What we do at IDW

Research

The Dolphin Survey Project was established at Cambridge University with Professor Sir Richard Harrison to monitor dolphin populations worldwide. IDW facilitates data input from a wide variety of professional and amateur dolphin watchers around the world. IDW co-operates with organisations monitoring cetacean populations in the North Sea and introducing people to observational and recording procedures. All research by International Dolphin Watch is non-intrusive. No research is conducted with captive dolphins. We do not approve of keeping dolphins in captivity.

Conservation

IDW actively lobbies governments worldwide – pressing for laws to be upheld where they are infringed and urging for changes in legislation that will help to save dolphins and protect the marine environment.

Education

IDW is actively involved in education and produces an Education pack. IDEAL (Integrated Dolphin Education and Learning) is based on a fictional dolphin named Dilo who fires the imagination and makes learning joyful for teachers, parents and children – including those with special educational needs.

Dolphin Watching Guidelines

IDW advocates guidelines on how to behave in the presence of dolphins for boat users and those who want to watch or swim with dolphins.

Strandings

IDW has friendly links with organisations with whom it collaborates in the rescue and treatment of stranded and injured marine mammals.

Native Wisdom

IDW is forging links with indigenous peoples, such as the Australian Aborigines, to find ways of applying their ancient wisdom and understanding of the natural world to help solve present ecological problems.

Dolphin Healing

IDW is researching dolphin healing and investigating ways in which the benefits of swimming with wild dolphins can be recreated artificially.

Dolphin Shop

IDW has a mail order shop which stocks a range of books and dolphin goodies. Details on the website.

Co-operation

IDW has a policy of co-operating, not competing, with other conservation organisations that strive to help dolphins.

Personality of the Month

Dr. Horace Dobbs – Founder and Honorary Director of International Dolphin Watch



Dr Horace Dobbs PhD is a pioneer undersea explorer. He founded The Oxford Underwater Research Group and has won numerous international awards for his books and films. Dr. Dobbs is a multi-discipline scientist who has published papers on atomic physics, pharmacology and medicine. He has studied powerful drugs that affect the brain and was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Medicine.

The direction of his life changed when he saw his son given a ride by a wild dolphin. In 1976 he founded International Dolphin Watch, a charity dedicated to protecting dolphins and understanding their relationship with humans. In his search to unravel what makes dolphins so special Horace discovered that they had healing powers. Having shown that swimming with dolphins can help those afflicted with clinical depression he set about finding ways in which the healing essence of dolphins could be captured and reproduced artificially. One result of his research is *Dolphin Dreamtime*, a 'sound pill' based on Australian Aborigine lore, which is now used extensively therapeutically.

In 1979 Horace was awarded the Silver Bowl in Public Speaking - awarded by the International Platform Association in Washington DC. Other recipients of the award included John F Kennedy, Winston Churchill MP, Richard Nixon, Bob Hope, Danny Kaye etc.

To introduce youngsters to the mysteries and often magical lives of dolphins, Horace started writing a series of children's books about a make-believe dolphin he dubbed Dilo. In a cooperative business venture with a school Horace used the publication of *Dilo and the Treasure Hunters* to give pupils practical experience in the creation of a commercial enterprise with due concern for the environment. This led to a further programme looking at ways in which dolphins could help children with learning difficulties. This resulted in another book *IDEAL – Integrated Dolphin Education and Learning*.

Around this time Horace was also developing the concept of using the latest technology to create an interactive sensory environment that would artificially reproduce the life enhancing experience of encounters with live dolphins. The outcome was a large dome that could accommodate entire families. A prototype was successfully demonstrated at an International Conference at the Open University in Milton Keynes in December 2003.

Horace then turned his attention to developing a much smaller dome, relatively cheap to produce, that would make the benefits of encounters with dolphins readily available to children of all abilities. The result, a *Dilo Dome*. A

prototype is currently undergoing trials in mainstream and special needs schools.

London Zoo leads dolphin rescue

London Zoo is leading an operation to save the Yangtze River dolphin, which has all but been wiped out by overfishing and loss of habitat. It is estimated that as few as 13 remain. Scientists from the zoo will oversee an operation to move the dolphins to a nearby lake, where the Chinese authorities will protect them. Sam Turvey, a spokesman, said: "This really is the last chance that we have to save one of the world's most evolutionarily distinct and unusual animals."

Dear NRDC Member,

I'm writing to report a big stride in our campaign to protect whales and other marine mammals from mid-frequency naval sonar.

Two weeks ago, NRDC attorneys raced to court to block the U.S. Navy from unleashing a barrage of ear-splitting sonar into the waters off Hawaii as part of a massive military training exercise. Whales exposed to mid-frequency sonar have repeatedly stranded and died on beaches around the world -- but the Navy refused to adopt even common-sense measures during peacetime exercises to help protect marine life from this deadly threat.

In an infuriating attempt to avoid our lawsuit, the Navy took the unprecedented step -- on the eve of the Fourth of July weekend -- of declaring itself exempt from the primary U.S. law that requires measures to protect marine mammals. But the court sided with us and found that the Navy's planned sonar use violated a second key environmental law as well, noting that NRDC had submitted "considerable convincing scientific evidence" of the dangers of sonar to marine life.

The judge prohibited the Navy from going forward with its sonar use as planned and ordered the Navy to sit down with NRDC and decide on a set of protective measures to be put in place during the month-long exercise. In the settlement reached last Friday after days of tough negotiation with our attorneys, the Navy will be required to create a sonar-free buffer zone around the newly

established Northwestern Hawaiian Islands Marine National Monument, as well as significantly improve its monitoring of marine mammals during sonar drills and implement other important safeguards.

This is an important victory, but much more needs to be done to protect whales and other marine life from high-intensity sonar, especially in biologically rich waters. As our campaign moves forward, we will continue to depend on your generous support and activism to compel the Navy to limit its use of harmful mid-frequency sonar. I hope you'll go to <https://www.savebiogems.org/whales/donate.asp> right now and make a contribution to support our ongoing legal efforts.

On behalf of our entire legal team, I want to thank you for coming to the defense of marine mammals around the world.

Dear friends

We had a deeply touching Christmas experience gifted by the whale nation in Golden Bay, which I wanted to share - over 100 whales stranded in Puponga Bay (South Island, NZ) and we went there to help. I have swum with them before and met them in their natural habitat - but this time was different – of course - and I am still totally ... hmm, what is the "right" word - can not find it... impressed (no, it is not that, but I hope you feel what I mean...) by the way they were. These big animals, stranded and seemingly helpless on dry land, some of them dead, were beaming love - there was no grief, no depression, the atmosphere was so uplifting! What great teachers, what wisdom! They surrendered totally to the moment, acceptance, love, peacefulness, gratitude, trust and gentleness! So gentle, so loving – they touched and opened the hearts of EVERYONE present... Even when the tide came in and the giant whale bull I connected with was floating again, he let us guide him through the water... he might know better than we where, when and how to go, I thought, but he waited, quiet, confident, powerful - amazing!!! My heart and mind is full of joy and happiness to be alive since this encounter... They gave so much... To stand in front of their sonar and feel the high frequencies of love penetrating the body was and still is SO healing... All of us present feel the inner changes since those special hours.

There surely are a lot of reasons for strandings - the Farewell Spit at the tip of the South Island is a trap for the huge marine mammals because of its shallow waters, there is a lot of "noise pollution", too, because of all the water taxis, ferries, motor engines (very sad what we are creating...), and the whales become disoriented and cannot use their sonar properly in the shallows... But I think they also brought us humans a very intense message and tried to create a bond with whoever was/is open for it - Peter and I have vivid dreams since then, and "our" whales speak to us in our dreams. Fantasy or not: it is very real and the messages sometimes beyond words. I receive them in pictures

so it is hard to translate them into words (without adding my interpretation...). I will try to do it nevertheless and write about it later - but the essence is mentioned above: abundance of love, gratitude, gentleness, exhilaration, joy of life... it was as if the whales created an energy field with those frequencies, and I think everybody present was deeply touched (literally!) by it. I hope that we all become conscious of our fellow nations on this planet, and not invade the living space of others, stepping in their habitat without respect and care - with our technologies we are able to do that and harm the others (we just "saved" a little butterfly from the road: somebody stepped on him, without seeing him, too small, we are not used to watch our steps, we think we do not have to...). I wish you all the best for the next year, a year full of laughter, joy and happiness, full of praise of life. And I thank you all for "being in touch" - I am glad our pathways crossed.




CD's of the Month

The stories I have written about him are all based on experiences I have had with friendly wild dolphins in the open sea.


One of the joys I have had from writing my Dilo books, a bonus if you like, is getting letters and Emails from young readers.

Dilo Dome News – *Dilo Dome faces a new challenge*

Introduction

The Dilo Dome is the latest outcome of over 20 years of research by medical scientist Dr. Horace Dobbs into the benefits of interacting with wild dolphins in the open sea. It is part of the long term, on going research programme, Operation Sunflower. To make the observed therapeutic benefits of swimming with dolphins widely accessible Dr Dobbs set out to recreate them artificially. He succeeded in several innovative ways. The latest, the Dilo Dome Project targeted specifically at children with special needs, was started early in 2004. It utilises the adventures of a make believe dolphin named Dilo, the eponymous hero of 5 books by Horace Dobbs (Watch Publishing), to take children on a playful, imaginary journey into the undersea world of dolphins.

Prototype Dilo Domes

The Dilo Domes that have been undergoing trials are based on commercially produced inflatable igloos made of translucent, very pale blue plastic. The structure takes shape and remains semi rigid when hollow ribs are inflated with a small foot pump. They weigh 5 kg, have a base diameter of 1.8 m and can easily be placed over a child with limited mobility in a bed or on the floor.

Trials in a school for special needs children, a hospital and a children's hospice have provided unequivocal evidence that the principle of creating a dome shaped enclosure in which children with special needs can experience the uplifting effects of encounters with dolphins is sound.

Trials in a wide variety of other situations have yet to reveal a single "normal" child who does not enjoy the experience of going into a Dilo Dome. The vast majority absolutely relish it. Involved parents and grandparents, anxious to purchase a dome, are told that Dilo Domes are not yet for sale. They are prototypes under trial. This widespread interest clearly indicates that in addition to therapeutic applications for

special needs children there is a large potential market for Dilo Domes for purely recreational purposes.

However, multiple use, deflating, packing into a small case, transporting and re-inflating the Dilo Domes at different locations has revealed a shortcoming. Slow punctures have developed which require the deflated panel(s) to be periodically re-inflated. Also the inflated plastic domes are vulnerable to deliberate or accidental damage.

So the time has now come to look for a new prototype without these disadvantages. A completely new structural concept needs to be designed and fabricated for the next generation of prototype Dilo Domes. One possibility is that a commercially available, dome shaped camping tent could be adapted.

The small circular opening at the top, through which children can poke their heads, has proved to be an attractive feature of the existing prototype Dilo Dome for active children. If possible this feature should be carried over into the next generation of prototypes. The new Dilo Dome does not have to be waterproof. But the covering must be of a translucent, flexible material onto which images of dolphins and underwater scenes can be printed, or stuck. Ideally the covering should be of a natural material such as silk. The framework supporting the dome must comply with the very high safety standards necessary for an apparatus used by children with special needs who can be destructive at times.


So that is the challenge the Dilo Dome Project now faces – a new prototype Dilo Dome is needed that can be tested and eventually put into commercial production. Thus providing a way of bringing dolphin joy into the lives of children around the world, whatever their circumstances, including those with special needs.

My Dolphin Story

Dancing with Dusky's



Dreams really do come true, I know, because recently one of mine did. Almost a month ago, I was privileged to have a 30-minute encounter with a pod of approx 20 Dusky dolphins.

Whenever I think about that wintry, overcast afternoon, within seconds my body is flooded with the same heavenly warm glow that I experienced with the dolphins that day. I can't stop smiling.

It was late in the afternoon, around 3:45. I was relaxing with my husband when I received a txt from my aunty that there were dolphins at Arkles Bay: Our local beach! Within seconds we were in the car and on our way. As we arrived I could see a couple of dolphins just metres from the shore. I kicked off my shoes and started walking, then running, passing dozens of people knee deep in water, then I was swimming. Without speaking, as if in a trance I made a beeline for those guys.

At that stage the pod looked about 100 metres out, and they were heading further out to sea. However, it was completely out of the question to give up, I was determined to be with them so I kept on swimming and called to

them to come back and play. I rolled onto my back and kicked my feet as hard as I could, I splashed, I even begged them to come back, all in the hope of attracting their attention. After a few minutes of kicking, to my delight, one lone dolphin turned and sped towards me to investigate. My heart soared and I dove down to meet him. Within seconds he appeared ahead of me, I heard his chirpy squeaks and clicks and felt a unique rush as his sonar pulses vibrated through my solar plexus as he swam the length of my body. I surfaced for air just in time to see the rest of the pod speeding towards me. I dove again, anticipating the moment and within seconds they were everywhere, darting in all directions underneath and around me, unbelievably just an arm's length away. The languid sea suddenly bubbling with activity. I was about ready to explode with excitement and joy. "You guys are beautiful!" "I love you!" I screamed to them.

We entertained each other, playing a wonderful game together, me diving and somersaulting under the water, them leaping and somersaulting, in synchrony 2 and 3 at a time. All sense of reality disappeared, as did the rest of the world including my husband who was waiting for me on the beach. I felt as if I could spend eternity with these beautiful characters. I don't ever remember feeling so full of love, or so safe, or so blissfully happy.

30 minutes was my eternity, then as quickly as this miracle had occurred, so too it was gone. I watched them leave, joyfully jumping their way along the cliff-edged coastline. Those cute guys were gone, I missed them immediately.

I swam to shore unable to remove the grin from my face. My husband greeted me and informed me I was a 'tinny bum' he was smiling too, and took a photo of me still basking in the glow. He later told me how relieved he was that I had returned. He had worried the dolphins and I would fall in love, and he would never see me again! Cute! We arrived home and it was just after 5 o' clock.

Footnote: There are moves afoot in some countries, mostly by people who have never been in the water with dolphins, to prohibit swimming with dolphins on various grounds, including harassment. This is an example of the dolphins being completely in charge of the situation. They came of their own volition. They stayed for a game and then departed, leaving Rocky filled to bursting with joy. I have seen this kind of experience happen to many, many others. It stays in their memories for the rest of their lives. When they talk about it, it brings dolphin joy to those who listen. Who are we to prohibit such wonderful, spontaneous experiences provided we show respect for the beautiful friendly mammals who have been described as "Man's Cousins in the Sea"?

It all began with dolphins and turtles, over a decade ago. I had been playing my didgeridoo at a talk by Dr Horace Dobbs of International Dolphin Watch in Devon, England. As I played, I prayed to the spirit of the dolphins to come and communicate with the audience. It was very successful, about 80% of the people found themselves dreaming of dolphins during my long hypnotic didge song. As luck had it Rebecca Fitzgerald was in the audience that day. She runs "DolphinSwim," a company taking small groups out to swim with wild dolphins in the Bahamas. She invited me to come along on board as a guest workshop leader. The BBC was also there filming a documentary called "Natural Neighbours," which has since been shown worldwide; perhaps you've seen it? For three consecutive nights before flying out I had the same lucid dream.

*Turquoise water, ocean dream
You hang suspended,
Quite able to breathe.
You wait as if for something
You know is about to happen.*

*Out from the depths
Great turtle swims,
Tireless, in its kin's ways
That spans five hundred million years.
Larger and larger and larger it grows.
You cannot move and you fear for your life
As it opens its' mighty mouth and swallows you whole!*

*There you are again, suspended in waters blue.
The Turtle has swallowed yet passed right through you.
Another Turtle swims in from the depths.
Mesmerised by its grace you wait, unable to move.
Larger and larger and larger it grows.
The great Turtle swallows yet passes through you,
Once more you are suspended in waters blue.
Something of the Turtle has imprinted in you.
Over and over again this happens,
It's like being cradled within Russian Dolls
Yet they are living Turtles, swum into your dream to

And then, when I got out to sea and jumped in the water for the first time with wild dolphins, a dolphin came up to me hung still in the water and we watched each other for a long while. Bemused, I followed and after 100 meters or so it turned around and looked at me

again and then nodded its head, indicating the space over my right shoulder, I turned to look and there, to my utter amazement was a huge sea turtle swimming in from the depths. I looked back to the dolphin and it got really excited and nodded its head up and down very fast and emitted a lot of sounds that swept through my body head to foot.

The turtle settled itself down on the sands 20 feet below and I took a breath and swam down, I curled up next to it and we just observed each other for a long long while. It was the oldest living creature I had ever seen.

This was my first experience of a lucid dream unfolding into a similar reality, and to me the dolphins were the guides between the two. There is particular magic to dolphins. Everyone who has encountered them physically or through their dreams will testify to this.

News from Mexico

Personal story of Dolphin Awareness,
Carmen María de Alba

I was born on 10th November 1974. My mother married my father instead of attending the water ski World championship. They met each other in Hawaii. My father was a surfer. We moved to Puerto Vallarta when my brother was born in 1978. We both grew up going to the beach almost every day and, practicing water sports such as swimming, snorkeling and fishing. I also practiced gymnastics for 9 years and had to leave due to a back injury. Not until I was married I started practicing Yoga and, then my life started changing in a very positive way. Having my first baby at home and in the water also changed my life forever. Yoga has helped me in every area of my life, leading me in to willing to share this with other women. I found myself discovering a midwife inside me as my grandfather who practiced midwifery all his life.

Then one day in a congress called "The Nature of Birth" I met a German midwife who came to our house and stayed. She invited me to swim with wild dolphins! And these experiences woke up dolphin awareness at a higher level of understanding. Then Elizabeth Battenberg, my German midwife friend, her family and I organized a "Dolphin Playshop" which was held January 2006, directed by Dr. Horace Dobbs, here in Boca de Tomatlán where I live with my family. The playshop was an invitation for gathering informally and sharing a daily boat trip in Banderas Bay. Although we did not see any dolphins that week, whales and manta rays were with us every day. Participants came from England, North America, Canada, Russia, Slovenia, and Mexico. Many different people joined us every day in a dolphin synchronicity.

Since then I have been going every other day in a little boat or kayak to observe and interact with wild dolphins. I have been very involved in community projects, painting a mural at kindergarden, doing yoga with children and teenagers...inviting people to do aqua yoga and kayaking too. When the water gets warmer and clearer as the summer comes, it will be perfect to practice in the water.

The hills are dry but the trees are blooming orange, pink and yellow. Dolphins are like love - they are everywhere! With our girls in the little boat, we saw a group of 5-7 bottlenose dolphins. I got in the water and some 50 meters away they started jumping in the air, flexing their spines in joy and bliss. I enjoyed being in the water with them until another boat came and the dolphins vanished. THEN a school of about 80 dolphins came! They were swimming fast and so we joined them in our little boat. The dolphins slowed down and so did we. I got in the water and they all passed by apart from the last 5-6 spotted dolphins that stayed to observe us.

I felt I must write and let you know what has been happening to me over the years.

I met you in about 1986ish in London when you were doing a talk about Operation Sunflower and Dolphin Dreamtime. I was fit and well and little did I know then how much your Dolphin Dreamtime tape would be helping me in the future.

Unfortunately in 1990 I had an accident at work and my health has been deteriorating ever since. I have tried various treatments over the years, orthodox and alternative and found listening to music helped. After listening regularly to the Dolphin Dreamtime Tape I wrote down what I had visualised. Interestingly the "Bay" where the dolphins are swimming is exactly the same and that image never changes. The move took a lot out of me and I hadn't got round to buying a 2006 calendar until May and I found one with pictures of various parts of Dorset on it. Imagine my surprise when I saw my "Bay" there on the calendar. The place I kept visualising was Durdle Door, Lulworth, Dorset. Although my "Bay" was at a different angle there it was, the famous rock arch, beach, and sea.

I was even more gob smacked when I later looked on the web about this place (www.soton.ac.uk/~imw/durdle.htm) and discovered a dolphin has actually visited there. The last time was 12th August 2002 known as George and he had also visited Bournemouth a few days before that.

That was another coincidence and here was yet another one. My local ME group (which I had only joined recently) had arranged a special boat trip from Weymouth for us and we were going very close to Durdle Door, Lulworth etc. in June. Great timing I thought. Before going there I took a couple of books out of the library and again more coincidences, not only to do with my career, poetry but also about ill health. Because of all these coincidences I planned a few days away to Weymouth and Durdle Door, Lulworth.

I got to beautiful Weymouth and unfortunately the boat was cancelled due to bad weather but I was able to meet other ME sufferers and we went on another boat which went around Portland instead of Lulworth. During the trip we were told that an oyster farm was near to Weymouth and I later found out the farm will be re-opened next year so I will definitely be going to that especially as it was in my Dolphin Dreamtime visualisation.

I realised I needed to extend my trip so I spent a few extra days at Durdle Door Caravan park and at last I visited my "Bay". Sadly I couldn't go down the path to the beach as it was too steep for wheelchair users but I was able to see my Dolphin Dreamtime "Bay".

Sadly no dolphins, but the many hours I was there, it was worth the visit. I felt so at home there. Something about that place it was like time stood still. It was so serene and beautiful. The sea, the countryside, the wildlife. Binoculars essential! It was a real tonic.

Another day I visited West Lulworth and Lulworth Cove and thought I might be able to visit Durdle Door by water but sadly the only boat there at the time was a rapid speed boat and was not recommended for the elderly or disabled. I even offered to hire the whole boat so long as they went slower but sadly they said no.

I wasn't too disappointed that I saw no dolphins as my trip was well worth it. It did me a power of good and has led me to do other things. But I won't give up and will be back there again very soon. I am determined to go on that beach and swim in the sea and if I'm very lucky a dolphin might come and say hello.

Synchronicity, coincidences, signs etc what ever word you use, I know these have given me some comfort and reassurances and that I'm on the right road, so to speak, and the Dolphin Dreamtime has definitely made my life better. I look forward to my next Dolphin Dreamtime and more synchronicities just watch this space.
